### THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

### **Practicing Stewardship**

We have concluded that if we ever think we have "arrived" when it comes to our stewardship, we may at that moment be like the steward scorned for burying his talents (cf. Luke 19 or Matthew 25). Stewardship is a process, not a destination.

1 Peter 4:10 challenges us to consider how we steward the spiritual gifts we have been given. Stewardship is about what we have. Each of us has spiritual gifts to employ for the common good and material goods that have been entrusted to us for enjoyment and sharing. This month, we want to direct your attention more closely to the connection between spiritual formation and stewardship. Because our walk with Christ is connected to everything we do, everything we are, and everything we have been given, growth in stewardship is a vital aspect of our spiritual formation.

Practicing stewardship is a vital aspect of spiritual formation. By stewardship, we are referring to much more than just our giving. Part of our growth as followers of Jesus is learning our role and carrying out our responsibilities as stewards in his kingdom. We believe we are stewards entrusted with spiritual gifts and material goods for the purpose of glorifying God, serving others, and making known the eternal gospel!

Stewardship is a spiritual journey. As we travel this journey together, may we open our hearts and minds to consider enhancing our understanding and practice of the giving of our time, talents, treasures, and service.

#### A Coordinated Approach Can End Homelessness

This requires using data to inform decisions about how to most effectively allocate resources, services, create legislation, and programs to best address the needs of those experiencing homelessness in our community. It means continually looking at what makes a true difference. Together we have the power of collective impact ......and we have Jesus calling us.

In March and April, our Social Justice Team, with other members of our church and town, joined in fact finding and discussions to better understand who our unhoused and at-risk neighbors are and what is impacting them. The goals have been to:

- 1- Shift our collective narrative. Recognize people experiencing homelessness, not as problems to be solved (or stigmatized and avoided), but rather neighbors to be cared for.
- 2- Reduce myths that stand in the way of helping our community work together (in nonpartisanship) to promote solutions to the issues that result in homelessness and costly disconnections.
- 3- Build relationships within our community to support what works; has a proven success record. Envision how we overcome broken and ineffective places in our systems,
- 4- Understand that while issues underlying homelessness are complex, we can impact these systems that need support. Building more affordable housing is only part of what's needed.
- 5- Create connections and relationships between different parts of our community that result in stronger supports for those trying to help our unhoused neighbors including community services, educators, our library, police, and health care providers.

As the Supreme Court listens to arguments about dealing with street homelessness, we remember that the people we see are only a small portion of our neighbors who are experiencing homelessness. The majority are disabled or working. Families we don't see.

We are grateful for author Don Burnes' leadership in growing our understanding of key issues. A wide variety of community members have joined us. Some are at the ground level of this work. We also appreciate the partnership of our Stratford Library Association and C.A.R.E. (Citizens Addressing Racial Equity) which allowed for wider community engagement.

The Scholarship Committee is pleased to announce that the following scholarships are now available:

- The Kate Sterling Bunnell Scholarship Endowment Fund This scholarship was
   established through the generosity of the late Catherine T. Mitchell. It offers financial
   assistance for college expenses to Stratford-resident students, based on financial need,
   without regard to academic achievement, sex, race or creed. Graduating high school
   students and undergraduate college students may apply. Applications are available on the

   2024.
- First Congregational Church Scholarships The following scholarships are available to students pursuing an undergraduate degree, who are members of First Congregational Church as of Jan. 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year. ### How can we help birds rest and feed during migration?

Manage your property with birds and insects in mind.

- \* plant grasses and flowers that are native to Connecticut and the northeast
- \* plant native trees and shrubs that produce fruit and berries
- \* leave parts of your yard unmanicured to give insects a place to take cover

### Cut out pesticides.

\* applying pesticides to your property kills insects. Insects are food that CT birds rely on. You're also killing butterflies, bees and other pollinators.

### Keep cats indoors.

\* outdoor cats kill an estimated 1.3 - 4 billion birds in North America

# May Is National Arthritis Awareness Month

### The Different Types of Arthritis and How to Treat Your Arthritis

While May is a time to celebrate the start of summer, this month is also National Arthritis Awareness Month. With 100 plus different types of arthritis and related conditions, more than 50 million adults and 300,000 children have some type of arthritis. While arthritis affects both men and women, it is more common in women. So, what are the most common types of arthritis and how can they be treated?

### **Osteoarthritis**

Osteoarthritis, also known as degenerative arthritis, is one of the most common types of arthritis. Over time, the cartilage in the joints can wear away, leaving the bone rubbing against the bone. This can cause pain, swelling, and stiffness in the joint. Some risk factors for this type of arthritis can include excessive weight gain, family history, age, and previous injury. When the joint symptoms of osteoarthritis are mild or moderate, they can be managed by balancing activity with rest, using hot and cold therapies, regular physical activity, healthy weight, strengthening the muscles around the joint for added support, assistive devices, over-the-counter pain relievers, and anti-inflammatory medicines, and avoiding excessive repetitive movements.

### **Inflammatory Arthritis**

The immune system's job function is to protect the body. This system generates internal inflammation to get rid of the infection and prevent diseases. But the immune system can go awry, mistakenly attacking joints with uncontrolled inflammation, causing joint erosion, and damaging internal organs, eyes, and other parts of the body. These types of arthritis include rheumatoid and psoriatic arthritis. Most researchers

autoimmune response. Early diagnosis and aggressive treatments are critical when experiencing inflammatory arthritis. Slowing down the disease's activity can help minimize or even prevent permanent damage. The goal of treatment is to reduce pain, improve function, and prevent further joint damage.

### **Infectious Arthritis**

Infectious arthritis is caused by a bacterium, virus, or fungus that enters the joint and triggers inflammation. Some organisms that cause this type of arthritis include salmonella, shigella (food poisoning or contamination), chlamydia, gonorrhea, and hepatitis C. In many cases, timely treatment with antibiotics can clear up the joint infection but arthritis may become chronic even after treatment.

With the right treatments and therapies, you may be able to live a normal life with your arthritis.

### Gift Card Year-Round Fundraiser

For the past few years, FCC Stratford has participated in an important fundraising program that allows participants to donate money to the church just by purchasing gift cards through the church. There are more than 400 retailers available in the program through RaiseRight. These include grocery stores, home improvement stores as well as some of your online favorites like Amazon. FCC Stratford buys the gift cards at a discount and sells them to you at face value. The church receives the difference as a commission for directing spending in this way.

We want to grow participation in this program because it's an easy way to raise significant amounts of money for the church simply by harnessing the spending and gift giving habits of our congregation, friends, and families.

There are two ways to help:

(1) Don Coulson and Amy Elias are available in Upper Packard Hall most Sundays after church. They keep a limited number of regularly used gift cards on hand with retailers like Shop Rite, Stop and Shop, Big Y, Walmart, Amazon, and Home Depot for same day purchase for use.



There is also an extensive list of almost any retailer you can think of that you can purchase for physical delivery the following week. Many congregants use this program to buy gifts for loved ones and friends. Simply bring a check made out to FCC Stratford or bring cash.
